May 28: Residential Garbage for Monday & Tuesday will be collected Tuesday, May 29th. *For the remainder of the week, collection will be on schedule.*

EARLY PLACEMENT OF REFUSE

The Village of Fairport is desirous of maintaining a clean and aesthetically pleasing community for our residents and visitors.

In an effort to facilitate this objective, the Village advises all residents to avoid placing refuse and other bulk items at the curb prior to the evening of their regularly scheduled pick-up.

Property owners who choose to place refuse prior to their permitted time, shall be assessed a removal fee should Village resources collect and remove the refuse that is in violation of Village Code. Green waste (leaves, tree branches, etc.) does not apply to this standard.

Fairport Lift Bridge Rehabilitation Project



New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) is planning for a major rehabilitation of the NYS Route 250 Lift Bridge over the Erie Canal in the Village of Fairport. The project objective is to repair deteriorated portions of the structure and replace lifting mechanisms. NYSDOT anticipates that the project will commence with construction as early as January 2019. NYSDOT estimates the bridge will be closed for approximately twelve (12) months.

As project information becomes available, the Village in partnership with the NYSDOT will keep the public informed.

North Main Street Improvements Expand Public Parking & Add Green Space

The Fairport Industrial Development Agency (IDA) is pleased to announce that construction work for an improved and enlarged public parking lot between Railroad and High Streets in the Village of Fairport has been completed. Improvements to the parcel, which is owned by the Fairport IDA, adds 35 additional parking spaces for a total of 61 with an enhanced layout, new lighting, pedestrian walkways, additional green space and landscaping.

BME Associates of Fairport served as engineers for this project, working closely with the Village of Fairport and adjacent property owners. Macedon Excavating and Paving, Inc. was awarded the construction contract. The improvements follow the recommendations of the 2012 Northwest Quadrant Master Plan and complement the 2016 Streetscape Plan Update.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION NEWS

The New York State and National Register List of Historic Places recently added The Potter Historic District to their lists. This "district" encompasses a total of sixteen acres of village land that includes the Potter Mansion and Carriage House, Potter Park and the private residences along Potter Place that were a part of the original Potter Subdivision.

The village has 37 individual structures already designated as important historic structures by the Fairport Historic Preservation Commission. The original Fairport Public Library (now the Perinton Historical Museum), owned by the Village, is the latest of ten structures listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Leaf Collection

Snow Removal



The Department of Public Works will be collecting bulk leaf piles starting in October and continuing through December, weather permitting. Bulk collection may be suspended and or delayed upon the first significant snowfall.

DPW crews will make every attempt to pick up your leaves on the day of your scheduled refuse collection, however during peak collection periods the collection days may vary. During these times crews start at the beginning of the route and continue until all leaves have been collected. This may result in your leaves being picked up a day early or late.

To assist the DPW in leaf collection the following tips are offered;

- All leaves must be placed in the tree lawn area for collection (between the sidewalk and curb).
- Leaves should be placed in one pile parallel to the street in a location Village equipment can access.
- Please do not place leaves near any obstructions such as trees, street lights, etc. Also do not rake into the street.
- Please ensure that leaf piles are free of sticks, rocks, and any other debris that may damage leaf collection equipment.
- Small piles (less than 2 to 3 cans) should be placed in containers. Small loose piles will not be collected.
- During the spring, leaves should be placed in containers. Large piles will be picked up with a loader.

As winter is quickly approaching again the Department of Public Works has several tips to assist with snow removal operations.

Please remember that there is no parking on Village streets from 3:00 AM to 7:00 AM November 1st through April 1st.

Residents clearing snow from their sidewalks and driveways should move snow only to locations on their own property.

Snow should not be shoveled or plowed onto neighbor's properties, onto sidewalks, across the street, or left in the street. Homeowners should direct plow contractors to abide by the same rules.

Village sidewalk plows will clear snow throughout the winter; please do not block public sidewalks in any way.

Help out your mail carriers by keeping sidewalks clear of snow in front of homes and mailboxes.

Assist the Fire Department by keeping nearby hydrants clear of snow at all times, in the event of an emergency.

Please remind children to stay away from snowplows and to not build tunnels into snowbanks.
